Rector's Report: Turn and Face the Change

"Turn and face the change," David Bowie tells us. "Time may change me, but I can't change time."

As we begin a new year (and the season of Lent by the middle of February) many of us make resolutions to live in different ways, or at the very least goals for what we imagine we might be able to accomplish. I love goal setting and strategic planning. I am so thrilled to be beginning the strategic planning process with St. Stephen's following our discernment process last year. However, turning to face the change isn't just about looking forward, it's about recognizing the past- what went well and what went wrong.

Our bishop, the Rt. Rev. Kym Lucas, recently shared that she does an examen at the end of each year. Examen is a spiritual practice created by St. Ignatius in which you look back on a period of time (usually the past day, at the end of the day) and reflect on where you felt God's presence or absence. Ignatius called these moments of consolation and desolation, but many people practice this using other language at work check-ins or sitting around the dinner table. What were your highs and lows? Roses and thorns? Or my personal favorite- poopsicles and popsicles?

St. Stephen's went through two significant staff changes during the season of Advent and the end of the year, which are busy enough seasons without having to say goodbye, hire new staff, and find a way to cover their work in the meantime. In the midst of all this change, I forgot to look back on the year that had passed.

This month, St. Stephen's welcomes Frank Perko III who will serve as both our director of music and our office administrator He has a strong background in both areas and is glad to be joining St. Stephen's full time. We are so grateful to God for sending him our way! Be sure to say "Hi" to him on Sunday morning or stop by during office hours to introduce yourself.



Frank Perko III a native to Colorado, recently moved back to the state in 2023, with his partner Jason, and his fur baby, Murphy, the sweetest Shar-Pei dog ever! Prior to Mr. Perko's return to Colorado, he held the position of Director of Music/Organist to the Episcopal Church of St. Bernard de Clairvaux, at the Ancient Spanish Monastery in North Miami Beach, Florida. Mr. Perko is the former Director of Music, Arts,

Worship, and Liturgy at First Plymouth Congregational Church of Denver, Colorado, which was one of the largest churches in the nation, within the denomination of the United Church of Christ. Mr. Perko began his professional work by age ten, both as a church musician for his local church, and also working as a professional staff organist, playing the Mighty Wurlitzer pipe organ at the Organ Grinder Pizza Restaurant in Denver, Colorado. In his professional career, Mr. Perko has served as Director of Music, Liturgical Director/Coordinator, and as Principal Organist for numerous churches across the United States. Frank has served as consultant, and been responsible for numerous new organ installations across the country, consisting of both large pipe organ and digital organ installations. He also created, owned, and cultivated his own large music, and piano based teaching studio. In 1996, Mr. Perko placed first, winning the Strader International Organ Competition in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Since then, Frank has won many awards and competitions as a classic/concert and theater organist, and continues to perform regularly in numerous concerts throughout the United States in churches, theaters, and concert halls. He has become known for his specialization in musical innovation, creativity, knowledge, and performances with MIDI capable instruments and in conjunction with the pipe organ. Mr. Perko is also a wellaccomplished and formidable orchestral and choral conductor, responsible for leading large and major works of music in the church and in the concert hall, with very large music ensembles of 150+ musicians. Mr. Perko holds a Bachelors of Music degree from Colorado State University, and a Master of Music degree from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.

What's next for St. Stephen's?

At our annual meeting on January 28th, we will discuss our goals for the next year. Here are three key areas you can expect to hear ongoing reports on as the year unfolds.

Continued Growth

We have been blessed not only by new faces and families in recent years but also by a deepening of our relationships with God and one another. Growth has been a strong part of what we feel called by God to do and will continue to shape our strategic plan going forward. Specifically, two key areas will be focused on next year:

1) Processes for Newcomers
Our congregational growth
committee will be focusing on
developing a communications
plan to reach out to specific
groups in our community who
might be best served by what we
have to offer. We want to make it
easier for people to communicate
with us through website and social
media. If you are interested in
being part of the congregational
growth committee, please speak

with Ariel Strickland.

We also want to have a clearer process for membershipidentifying key practices that define our church, what opportunities for service and fellowship are available for newcomers, and developing classes and rituals to support people in becoming a part of church. During Lent, Rev. Kate will be offering a pilot course called Foundations of St. Stephen's. This class would be a 4 week class for newcomers to get to know one another and the church. We are hoping both newcomers and old-timers will join us for the class beginning February 28th (at 11am or 6:30pm) as we discuss the core values and practices of our community and offer feedback on this class.

We'll also have a confirmation

class in April and May and celebrate new members and recently confirmed members at Pentecost.

2) Adding an additional worship opportunity

Our church is beginning to get full at the 10am service, especially in the summer when the choir is in the pews. We also have energy for trying different times, music, and formats in worship. In January, we'll take a survey of the congregation to see what options people might want to be a part of new worship. We'll also be looking for a small group of people who would be interested in helping plan and launch a new service. We will meet throughout the year and begin offering monthly worship in the summer then hopefully weekly in September.

Strategic Planning

In 2023 we spent time reflecting on who we are as a church and what God is calling us to do. After months of conversations, a vision team put together a statement (see box).

The next step is to adopt this vision statement and create a balcony team that will help plan concrete steps to put into action over the next 3-5 years to implement this vision. The team will be appointed in January to begin work in the spring. Please speak with Rev. Kate if you would be interested in helping.

Administration and Finance

We are in the process of rearranging our staff configuration. Members of the vestry are reaching out to similar sized churches in our area to see how they handle everything from bookkeeping to house keeping to benefits for staff. We plan to work with a bookkeeper in the coming year and will be implementing a new software program to better manage both our membership database and our finances. We also plan to finally go through the various vendors and fees of the church to see if there are any places to cut costs. Overall the intention is to streamline operations so that we continue to grow and use the resources God and our congregation has so graciously blessed us with well.
